The Beeline Expressway (also known as SR 528) that runs to and from the airport was renamed the Beachline Expressway in 2005, since it is the quickest route to Cocoa Beach. So if you're using a map that still calls it the Beeline, it's time to get a new one.

The I-4 is the highway in central Florida that connects Tampa on the Gulf Coast with Daytona Beach on the Atlantic Coast. However, although I-4 runs eastwest through the state of Florida, it runs north-south through the city of Orlando. So as you are driving into town from

the airport on the 528 (The Beachline), you must go west (even though you are technically traveling south) on I-4 towards Tampa to get the to attractions and you go east on I-4 towards Daytona Beach to get to downtown Orlando, even though it is actually to the north. Also remember, when you're in downtown Orlando, the official East-West Expressway is the 408.

Oh, and one more thing: The I-4 is parking lot during rush hour. So avoid using it during peak hours but if you must, be sure to allow yourself extra time to get to your destination.


# From Stovetop to Sundecks Everywhere
